

Source Protection

Authority: organization whose responsibilities include providing administrative and technical support to the source protection committee and the source protection planning process. In most cases this is the conservation authority board, which is comprised of representatives appointed by municipal councils.

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Committee: it is proposed the committee will be made up of representatives from watershed stakeholders (such as municipal, agriculture, landowners, industry, environmental non-government organizations) and members of the public at large and would work together with municipalities, conservation authorities, and provincial agencies.

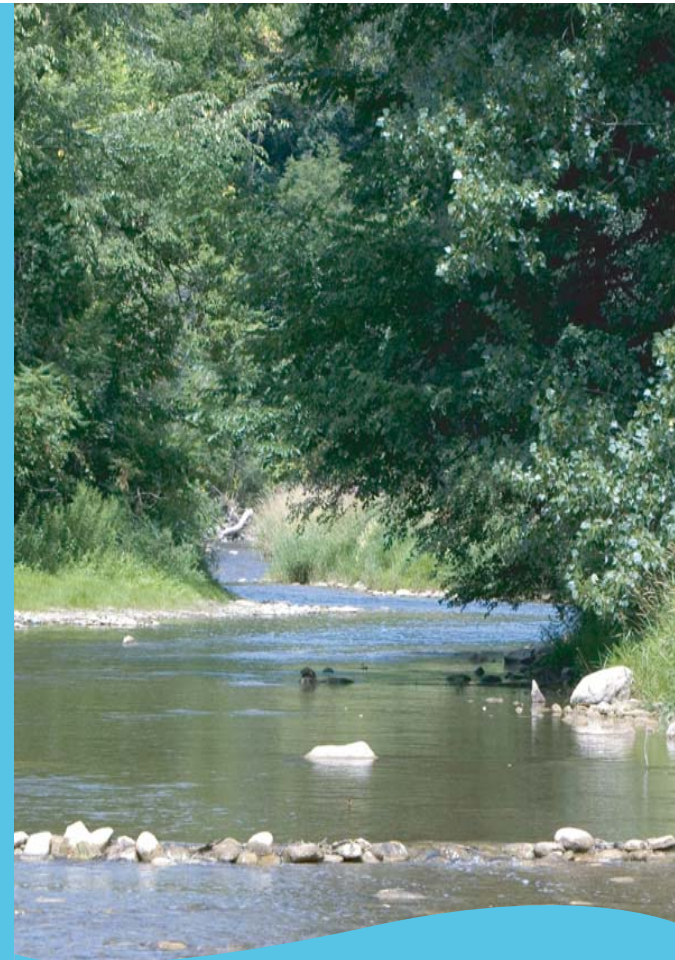

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Roles and Responsibilities for the Clean Water Act, 2006

The Ontario government passed the Clean Water Act to help protect drinking water at the source, as part of an overall commitment to safeguard human health and the environment.

The legislation sets prevention as its fundamental principle. Keeping the sources of our drinking water free of contamination is smarter, safer and more effective than cleaning up problems after the fact.

A key focus of the legislation is the production of locally developed, science-based drinking water source protection assessment reports and source protection plans.

The following information provides an overview of roles and responsibilities under the Clean Water Act.
